Focus: 'Safe' Roads

The Council's press office recently heralded a drop in road casualties in Camden using the headline "Accidents Fall on Safe Streets of Camden" (see full press release on our site). Whilst the drop in fatalities from 13 in 1997 to 5 in 1998, and a decrease in reported injuries from 1,677 to 1,566 in 1998 is welcome, these figures are still shocking in terms of human cost ... and we cannot accept that our streets merit the use of the word 'safe'. If they were, our borough would be filled with cyclists, & there wouldn't be petrified pedestrians dodging cars as they tried to cross our 'safe' roads!

Meanwhile, a new Friends of the Earth report reveals that 33 of the 50 worst polluted roads in London are in the boroughs of Camden, Barnet & Haringey. The worst pollution in Camden is in Finchley Rd, Prince Albert Rd, Camden High St, Avenue Rd, Camden Rd, & Parkway.

Whilst the proposed 20 mph zones (see below) may help tame some wilder motorists, unless the majority of Camden's councillors join forces to forge an environmental vision for our borough, and follow it through with a radical implementation programme. we don't expect big improvements in road safety or air/noise pollution. How about real traffic reduction via road space reallocation, street closures, & big cuts in on & off-street parking bays?

Short Cuts

Traffic reduction

In early May Glenda Jackson MP was the keynote speaker at a Camden meeting organised by Friends of the Earth, which attracted 200 people. When asked if she would honour her pre-general election pledge to support a 10% traffic reduction target, she committed the government to setting a target for an unspecified percentage cut, but only 'before the next general election'. And she admitted that the 1998 Transport White Paper measures will lead to an estimated 25% increase on current traffic levels by 2010.

Camden's Plan to Encourage Walking?

A pedestrian has claimed against Camden after tripping on a loose paving stone. The council's solicitors retaliated with a 7 point list of 'contributory negligence', including failing to place his feet carefully,

carrying shopping bags which were too heavy, and walking too fast! He's presumably learnt his lesson, & now drives everywhere.

Traffic Schemes

Camden is to be congratulated on consulting the public on four large 20 mph zones over the last 2 months: East & West Kentish Town, Camden Sq. & Regents Park Estate.

But we have objected vehemently to the huge amount of diagonal parking planned for the West Kentish Town controlled parking zone; it squanders precious road space, encourages high levels of car ownership (& thus car use), & adds new hazards for pedestrians & cyclists.

Better news is a plan to close Jeffrey's Street, & make Castle Road no entry to westbound motorists; both measures are proposed for the roads' junctions with Kentish Town Road, & each will allow cyclists through.

And formal consultation is due any day now for an extension of the physically segregated two-way cycle track in Royal College Street southwards to the Crowndale Road crossing.


